To prepare us a dwelling place there

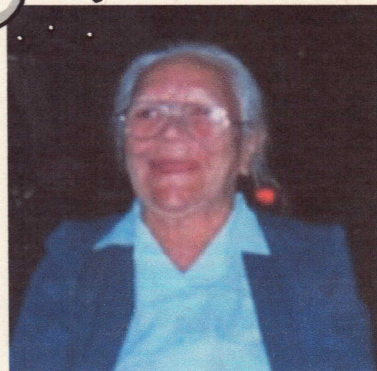
*In the sweet bye and bye
